

Plagiarism

According to the web:

- The false presentation of someone else's writing as one's own. In the case of copyrighted work, plagiarism is illegal.

- Presenting the words or ideas of someone else as your own without proper acknowledgement of the source.

- Plagiarism involves using the work of another person and presenting it as one's own. Any of the following acts constitutes plagiarism unless the source of each quotation or piece of borrowed material is clearly acknowledged:

- Plagiarism is the act of copying or borrowing the work or ideas of another author without acknowledgement. Students who are writing essays, reports, dissertations or theses must list their sources, such as books and journal articles, in a list of references appended to their work.

- The willful act of presenting another person's work as one's own.

MLA

Due to recent issues with plagiarism, all essay options must now be completed using MLA format. This means that if you are using a source word for word, you must put the quote in "quotations" and tell me the source it came from.

If you do not do this your paper will be considered plagiarized and you will receive a considerable deduction in points if any credit is awarded at all.

***Be advised, this does not mean that you can copy your entire paper and put it in "quotes"!!!**

The Modern Language Association (MLA) Style is widely used for identifying research sources. In MLA style you briefly credit sources with parenthetical citations in the text of your paper, and give the complete description of each source in your Works Cited list. The Works Cited list, or Bibliography, is a list of all the sources used in your paper, arranged alphabetically by author's last name, or when there is no author, by the first word of the title (except A, An or The). [5.1-5.5]

For example:

In the text of your paper:

The first gambling Web site appeared in 1995, and online gambling has since become the most lucrative Internet business (Will 92).

or,

George Will reported that in 2002 Internet gambling surpassed pornography to become the Internet's most lucrative business (92).

In your Works Cited list:

Will, George F. "Electronic Morphine." Newsweek 25 Nov. 2002: 92.

In-Text Citations

Because Internet sources typically have no page or paragraph numbers, and Web sites often list no author, people are often confused about how to refer to these sources within their papers. The answer is to cite the author's name whenever possible, and use the source's title otherwise (or a shortened version of the title). If no page or paragraph number is provided, leave that portion of the citation blank. Keep in mind that the primary purpose of an in-text citation is simply to point readers to the correct entry on the "Works Cited" page.
